Have a go at baking Anglo-Saxon honey oat cakes. These are easy to make and very tasty. Serves 10–15 people.

Anglo-Saxon honey oat cakes Time: 30 minutes Medium

Ingredients

350 grams rolled oats (whole rolled oats if possible) 225 grams butter 225 grams honey Pinch of salt



Method

- 1. Melt the butter in a medium-sized saucepan
- 2. Add the salt, honey, and oats and stir until they are well mixed.
- 3. Line a baking tray with greaseproof paper or a little butter.
- Spoon the mixture out onto a greased baking tray and press it down well.
- 5. Bake at 170°C for 30 minutes or until golden brown.
- 6. Cool for a few minutes then mark into squares while still warm and serve when cold.
